#### **Mission Statement**

on Saturday night. The evening included the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the Class of 1962. Tasseled souvenir booklets were given to each class member. This class along with the classes of 1960 and 1961 and 1963 were the first students to move into the then new school on Cleveland Avenue in Sept 1959 when it officially opened. It was a new experience for all of these students to be moving away from Jeff Davis Avenue and over to an area fashioned, home-cooked, melt-in-yourthat "seemed to be out of town." This group included society members Beth Hansen, Danny Hansen, both class of '60, Eddie Ware, class of '63 and countless others. The Busy Bee Cafe was sorely missed over at the new remote location and it is most fitting that we share the memories of graduate Rose Switzer Donaldson, class of 1957, who has written down the same thoughts that are probably passing through the minds of anyone who went to the high school on Jeff Davis Avenue.

# The Busy Bee

This is written to the best of my remembrance, which is not always exact. I hope it is accurate enough to evoke some fond memories in the minds of those of you and even the rhumba. That is where we who grew up in Long Beach in the 50's. As I recall, around 1950 or so, when I was about 13 years old, a new café was opened by a local restaurateur named Bennie Stallone in Long Beach. It stood on the corner of Jeff Davis Ave, just across the street from the school, which at that time housed 1st grade through 12th, around 130 students. Shortly after opening as Bennie's Ice Cream Parlor, Jim and Bea Shuhardt took over and changed the name to The Busy Bee. A lady named June Lobe and the Moonlight, quietly faded out Lemon, mother of Terry Lemon, a class or two behind me, went to work there as waitress for the Shuhardts and the world changed for those of us going into our teens. We had a HANGOUT! If you ever watched the T.V. show Happy Days, we lived it, complete with Arnold's, their hangout on that show

As you entered The Busy Bee, just to the left was a small dance floor with a Juke Box against the wall, where we played the latest hits by Elvis, Chuck Berry, Fats Domino, Theresa Brewer, Connie Francis, and so many more I can't name them all. Rock and Roll was just hitting its stride, thrown in with Country, and Pop. The first

time I ever heard Hound Dog and Blue Suede Shoes was on that Juke Box... To the right was the soda counter, with attached padded seat stools on a revolving pedestal. Behind the dance area were several booths, which seated about eight comfortably, ten if we scooched. The menu consisted of hamburgers, french fries, hot dogs, onion rings, chips, and plate lunches, and I'm not talking fast food, it was oldmouth GOOD, with real ice cream shakes, sundaes, banana splits, and fountain sodas, and all for a tenth of what that would cost today. We all ate lunch there every day, stopped off after school, after the football games, dates, movies at the Lobe Theatre, which was just next door, the Moonlight Drive-in, just down Highway 90, or the skating rink in Gulfport. Jim and Bea were probably in their early forties at that time, June maybe a bit younger, and they went all out to provide us with a good, clean, and well-supervised place to gather, and we adored all three of them. June, who was a former dancer, gave a group of us dance lessons, jitterbug, foxtrot, waltz, had our first romances, arguments, cried over our break-ups, laughed over our misadventures, celebrated our triumphs, mourned our defeats, and heard all the latest gossip.

Our class graduated in 1957, and we all moved on or away. A family named Luter eventually took over the café, but it was never quite the same as those glorious days of the early fifties for those of us who were there. The Busy Bee, along with the of existence in the 60's, but will always be a part of the lives of those teen-agers like myself who remember.

Note: The photo and poem came from another former student, Betty Lou Hancock, who was a class or so ahead of me. She has been married to Alan (Baby) Holder for many years, and if I am not mistaken, the car parked in front in the photo belonged to her brother, James Hancock! Both are well-known lifelong residents of Long Beach.

# **SPOTLIGHTINGOLDERHOMESINLONGBEACH**



Built in 1879 on Church Avenue as a 18' x 24' structure. it served as the Methodist Church from 1879 to 1904 when a new church was built. The building was moved to its present location and remodeled into a residence more than double its original size. It has remained a residence sine 1904 and is one of the oldest remaining structures in Long Beach.
